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
Four SEL skills that can be learned through creative play: 1. Relationship skills: Listening to other points of view, collaborating, sharing, taking turns 1. Social awareness: Showing understanding and empathy towards others, prosocial behaviors 1. Self-regulation: Managing emotions, self-aware, impulse-control, choice-making 1. Creative confidence: Expressing yourself, how you feel, who you are, what you care about

1. Build relationship skills through art and play

- Create a culture that supports community building and collaboration.
- Help children build the **language** they need to collaborate productively.
- Create collaborative spaces and other smaller, autonomous spaces so children can move around the room and have a choice to work alone.
- Prepare for teachable moments. Expect that collaboration can be hard and takes practice.



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
2. Develop empathy and understanding through art & play

- Learn social rules: cooperate with others, engage in prosocial behavior, better self-control, sharing, patience, builds frustration tolerance
- Funds of knowledge: learn about different traditions, cultures, families; builds understanding and tolerance for other points of view
- Unlike some curriculums that try to isolate and teach SEL through worksheets and hypotheticals, create the conditions to practice empathy in context - in real time - through open-ended creative experiences.



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${\bf 3.}$ Self-regulation through art and play

- Audit the child's environment, making sure to offer sensory experiences to regulate nervous system (playdough, kinetic sand, water, different texturalblocks, etc.)
- What else can you add to the space to $\it increase \, sensory \, opportunities, like \, soft$ fabrics, new mark making tools, natural materials?
- $\mbox{\bf Autonomy}$ in the space. Design space to have bigger collaborative experiences
- and also quieter spaces for children to work alone.

 Movement and freedom. Less of a need for children to self-regulate if they have the opportunity to move!
 - Safety and security. Offer invitations and access to materials more than once.



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4. Build creative confidence through art and play

- Shift grown up mindset from making a product to **working like an artist**: inventive, playful, iterate, experiment. Worry less about effort.
- Get comfortable with children throwing work away, it's not about the product.
- **No limit on materials.** Work with scrap paper, cardboard, materials that are not precious so they can try, iterate over and over again.
- Offer same invitations again and again so children can practice, find new ways of using materials and expressing their ideas.
- Adult plans and prepares, then steps back. Avoid judgement there is more than one way to use a material.



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How creative play supports *children*:

- Contextualizes social emotional learning in real time
 Thought provoking experiences that form a connected classroom community
- Boosts creative confidence and sense of self
 Deep engagement and joy
 Nurtures curiosity, risk-taking, and innovation

- o Learn to self-express, advocate, and **communicate ideas** through art and play

 Educates the whole child



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How creative play supports *teachers*:

- Makes **educating and nurturing the whole child** possible **Open-ended invitations** reach all types of learners
- Materials are low prep, easy to source, inexpensive $\textbf{Easy to integrate} \ \textbf{literacy, math, and other academic skills}$
- in meaningful ways
 Develops a connected classroom where children feel a **sense** of belonging

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
