












The Power of Pronouns



Your baby develops receptive language skills, the ability to understand and respond to *familiar* words, sounds, and voices, while still in the womb!

Reaction vs. Response

A reaction is a subconscious, emotion based survival-oriented defense mechanism.

A **response** is a decision based on information from both the conscious mind and unconscious mind.

You are not in charge of a child's choices. They are. You are in control of how you choose to respond.

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




Get their attention before you communicate.

Connect Before You Expect

- Get down on their level
- Say their name
- Say, "Look at my nose so I know you hear me."
 Say, "I have something to tell you" or "I have a question to ask you."

 Change your tone or use a whisper voice

Defining grown up jobs while including kid friendly jobs helps kids feel included, while proactively avoiding a power struggle



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"Tell Me More"

Encourage connection and open communication, creative thinking and expressive storytelling whether they can "talk" yet or not!




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Language that develops

emotional awareness and self-regulation skills.



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"I'll wait"

When a toddler screams or cries, interrupting you as you're trying to talk to them or they clearly need more time to process their feelings.

You model waiting. They learn to stop and wait too!



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Interpret Intonation and Affect

Connecting emotional vocabulary to how you look and sound helps them understand feelings and emotions.



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Allow side-by-side silence

Benefits:

Allows processing time Relationship building Safety in silent connection
Build Independendent Play 'muscle'



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Language that develops a child's sense of self, intrinsic motivation and early identity.



Emotional Response Language: Sensory Response Language: It feels like you are... It sounds like you are... It looks like you are... It smells like you are...

Craft your responses like you were actually having a conversation, but string together short, complete sentences so they can process them.



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

Narrate What You See & Hear with 'You are' statements.

If it's yes - say "yes" If it's no - say "not" If it's maybe - say "You wish"











What we say vs What they believe

You say:

I am so proud of you. I knew you could do it!

When I do things like this, I make her proud.

I should do more things like this so she is proud of me.

You mean:

I am so amazed by all that you can do! I know you can do hard things.

What you want them to believe:

I did that. I'm so proud of myself.



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"What's Your Plan?"

A proactive question inserted in potentially problematic or unsafe behavior.

- You are trying a new way to go up the stairs.
- I trust that you feel safe.
- Wow! Look at your feet doing



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"Show Me"

Show me when... Show me how to... Show me where ...



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Language as a catalyst that encourages and empowers early choice making & ownership of natural consequences.

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"Wow! That was Unexpected"

- A loud noise (fire alarm)
- A child throws a toy across the room (behavior choice)
- A child takes a toy from another child (sharing struggles)



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
